LETTER FROM DON

Genuine Healing in God's Son

Let's imagine that you and I happened to get on the same elevator. To ease the moment, you greet me and ask, "What is it that you do?"

In the short 30 seconds or less that I might have with you, I would tell you that I am the CEO of a Christian ministry to Native American and Hawaiian Natives. I would summarize our purpose by saying how we help those we serve in ministry to be all that God intended for them to be. We share with them how, through the grace of God, He offers His Son Jesus to bring genuine healing in their lives and repairs the damage that life's circumstances sometimes piles on our people.

Occasionally, I have the opportunity to share our ministry purpose on a plane trip from somewhere. This occurred recently, following a speaking engagement at Concordia Lutheran College in Selma, Alabama.

There, I was privileged to share our vision for ministry with a new acquaintance. I told her my own story of growing up on a reservation, the lost dreams that plagued my parents and how we were impacted as children. My experiences eventually led me to Jesus and His power to take our most difficult, even tragic circumstances, and transform them into blessings.

I told the lady I had written a book about my experiences. I happened to have a copy of my

book, *Broken Parts Missing Pieces*, with me and gave her an autographed copy. She seemed delighted,

promised to read it and asked how she could contact me in the future.

In our brief time together, I could tell that this person had some disappointments in her own life. A divorce was not likely her only loss. My brief conversation reminded me what we all know so well. We are all in need of God's grace to repair the parts of our lives that have suffered due to lost opportunity, personal failure or trauma in our lives. Sin and its affects cause us all much suffering. All of us are in need of God's gracious hand of forgiveness and healing.

One of the keys to our ministry is understanding how much God loves us and longs for us to be in relationship with Him. I like to quote Brennan Manning, a Christian author, who wrote, "I am utterly convinced that on Judgment Day the Lord Jesus is going to ask us one question and only one question. 'Did you believe that I loved you, that I desired you and that I waited for you day after day, that I longed to hear the sound of your voice?"'

It is this sense of God's love for all men that drives our passion for ministry and our joy in sharing this ministry with you. Thank you for being a part of us. God bless you.

Arctic Conversations

From the northernmost Indian village in the world to Emmonak in Southwest Alaska, we have followed God's Spirit in all our comings and goings and watched how the Gospel created, sustained, and nurtured faith in the lives of the Native peoples.

Alaska is so vast that it is overwhelming to think of reaching out to 229 remote villages. We made it into 17 villages last year—a few of them multiple times. If we were to go into 229 villages a year, it would take about 11 years to make it once into each of them.

Those are daunting numbers to consider, but our focus isn't on numbers. Our goal is to first develop relationships with the elders and leaders in the tribal communities. The entrance into the community has been largely led by our volunteers feeding us information that could be relevant to identifying potential spiritual leaders and making introductions to key people in the community. This way we have many eyes on the village.

Once we identify a candidate, we pursue a relationship. For instance, we met a young man who has been telling our volunteers for

several years that he thinks he would like to become a pastor. This young man will be coming to our mission center with 10 other youth.

Rosemary organized a weeklong camp/ retreat for youth from the villages. The idea is to help village children learn to navigate in urban settings while nurturing their faith. Some of these kids have never been out their villages. At some point in their lives, they will have to spend time learning to navigate the dominant culture that you and I live in.

We also met a young man from Kotzebue who now lives in Anchorage. We have been developing a relationship for a couple of years. Vetting people takes time and prayer and relationship. Pray for God leading in this and all we do.

Yes, it has been a busy year with lots of good things happening and plenty of challenges. We covet your prayers and value your friendships. Thank you for allowing us to share the greatest story of all—the story of God with us.

Hawaii to Alaska: Lessons Learned

For instance, in the village of Chalkyitsik, Alaska, they had little or no Bible teachings since their pastor passed away many years ago. The children we worked with had little or no knowledge of the stories of Creation, Or no knowledge of the stories of Creation, Mosh and the flood, or Joseph and his coat of many colors. literacy and outreach since they will not get this in their public school curriculum.

In Alaska, our main priority was to bring to Native peoples the Good News of our Savior Jesus Christ. We did this by sharing each other's languages and stories. We had been given seven puppets to use in storytelling, including a raven. I was surprised when all the children wanted to play the raven. I asked when all the children wanted to play the raven. traditional oral stories of the raven in their beautiful Gwich'in language, as well as all the other puppet stories such as the wolf, bear, rabbit and even a skunk. We highlighted those animals in our Bible stories and let the children act them out. The Holy Spirit used those cultural links to touch their hearts and bring understanding.

There is tremendous need for Bible literacy and Gospel outreach among all Native youth, including our Hawaiian Native young adults. By God's grace, your continued prayers and support help make it happen. You are connected to our outreach in this way as a result.

Last November at the Lower Elwha Tribal Center, we filled rows of tables topped with knitted mittens, hats, scarves, sweaters, gloves, baby blankets and baby items, quilts and blankets, all handmade from volunteer quilters and knitters and LWML groups from all over the United States. We also had several tables filled with holiday food for families to cook their own Thanksgiving or Christmas dinners.

As people came in, we handed them a bag to pick up what they needed. It was such a joyous time helping them shop. The room was filled with laughter as people mingled and made their selections. Everyone was so grateful as they took only what they needed.

We were amazed by the stories we heard from people as they left. Teachers from the Native head start and preschool picked up sets of hats, scarves, sweaters and coats for students who were so cold that they were unable to stay focused in class. Another couple thanked us as they were leaving, eyes filled with tears as a tribal elder's wife explained that her husband was out of work

and needed shoes. They were so happy that they found a pair of shoes in his exact size along with warm socks! What is truly amazing about this is that, due to our lack of storage space, we don't collect shoes or clothing for adults, yet God miraculously provided them on that day for this tribal elder. We still don't understand how that one pair of shoes and socks got put in with all the stuff we brought from the Hope House. Afterward, this couple invited us to their home to share the Gospel with them.

That day, more than 160 people found just the items they needed. Praise the Lord! Looking forward, from now until September of this year, we will be collecting NEW backpacks for children in grades K-12. Last year there was a shortage for our Native children and we want to make sure that doesn't repeat itself this year. Our goal is to collect 500 new backpacks for the Lower Elwha and Neah Bay reservations. Washington/Neah Bay - Makah Lutheran Church experienced another year of growth with their children's ministry, often seeing as many children in the program as they had for total church attendance.


